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A message from the Administrator



Greetings from the Village of Cross Plains!

I know I speak for the Village Board and staff when I say we hope you had an enjoyable holiday season and a happy new year. The end of 2016 was busy for all us at the Village... We had a federal election to administer, a presidential recount, the 2017 budget to adopt, the start of tax collection season, and a couple of snowstorms to clear. Now that it is 2017, we are not slowing down one bit!

For this newsletter, I would like to focus on the 2017 election cycle and provide you with some information on what to expect this year. There will be two elections in 2017, a spring primary election on Tuesday, February 21st and a local election on Tuesday, April 4th. Each election will be held at the Cross Plains-Berry Fire Station (1501 Bourbon Road) and polls will be open from 7 am to 8 pm for both elections.

The February 21st election will be a primary for the State Superintendent of Public Instruction; no local races will appear on the ballot. The local election on April 4th will include four local races. The races include the position of Village President and three Village Trustee positions. Each office is elected to serve a two-year term. On the right is the list of Village candidates and the office they are seeking. These candidates completed the necessary steps required to have their name appear on the ballot.

Voter Information for Spring Elections

Photo ID: As of press time for this newsletter, a photo ID is required to vote in Wisconsin. A Wisconsin driver's license, Wisconsin DOT issued ID, military ID card or passport are some of the acceptable forms of identification. More information is available at <http://bringit.wisconsin.gov>.

Registration: If you're unsure that you are registered to vote in the Village of Cross Plains, please check the website: <https://myvote.wi.gov/> or contact the Village Clerk's office at 608-798-3241. You can register on the MyVote Website or in person at Village Hall with acceptable proof of residency. You may also register on election day at the fire station with acceptable proof of residency.

Absentee Voting: Registered voters may vote absentee by mail (you can request a ballot in writing with a copy of your photo ID) or in person at Village Hall as soon as ballots are available. Absentee voting in person at Village Hall will be available weekdays from 7:30 am to 4 pm. In-person absentee voting ends at 5 pm on the Friday before each election.

Cross Plains Police Department



As I write this update for the newsletter I am reminded by the cold temperatures and the falling snow that winter has a firm grip on us and has everyone longing for spring. I hope you are finding a way to enjoy the outdoors in any way you can. Although the amount of snow has limited the amount of time the snowmobile trails have been open there have been some opportunities to get out and enjoy the scenery our area has to offer. Along with that, when the trails were open, the Village again has experienced some individuals who simply do not want to follow the rules. Village staff has been working with the local snowmobile club to get the word out regarding the ordinances and how they pertain to snowmobiles operating within the village. I have included the pertinent ordinance for you to review. If you are a snowmobiler please make sure you are following the ordinance so everyone may continue to enjoy access to the trails.

SECTION 52.02 Snowmobile Operation.

- (a) **General Prohibition.** Except as otherwise provided in this Section, it shall be unlawful to operate any snowmobile on the Village streets, alleys, parks, and parking lots, or on any public land, private land, or parking lot held open to the public. The operator of the snowmobile shall at all times have the consent of the owner of land before operating a snowmobile on private lands.
- (b) **Permitted Use of Snowmobiles.** Snowmobiles may be operated in the Village on public right-of-ways only as follows:
- (1) Snowmobiles may be operated on public streets for the purpose of residential access. "Purpose of residential access" means for the purpose of traveling the shortest distance between the snowmobile operator's residence and the Village or County snowmobile route or trail that is closest to that residence.
 - (2) Snowmobiles may be operated in the Village on the marked snowmobile route.
 - (3) Snowmobiles may be operated in public parks and on other municipal property where their use is approved by the Director of Parks, Recreation and Conservancy.
 - (4) Snowmobiles may be operated for law enforcement emergency purposes as permitted under Section 350.02 Wis. Stats., by public utilities as permitted under Section 350.045 Wis. Stats., and for snowmobile events authorized in accordance with Section 350.04 Wis. Stats.
- (c) **Authority to Open and Close Snowmobile Routes and Prohibit Residential Access.** The Chief of Police or Director of Parks, Recreation and Conservancy may declare any snowmobile route, or part thereof, in the Village closed at any time and may prohibit the use of snowmobiles for the purpose of residential access in the Village, or any part of the Village at any time. All snowmobile routes in the Village are closed, and the use of snowmobiles for the purpose of residential access in the Village are prohibited, when any Dane County snowmobile trail or route located within one mile of the Village is closed, except that the Chief of Police or the Director of Parks, Recreation and Conservancy may subsequently reopen any snowmobile route or street for the purpose of residential access irrespective of a county trail or route being closed.
- (d) **Operation on Sidewalks Prohibited.** No person shall operate a snowmobile upon any sidewalk, pedestrian way or upon the area between a sidewalk and curb of any street, except for the purpose of crossing by the most direct route to obtain access to an area in which the snowmobile may be lawfully operated.

SECTION 52.03 Speed Limit.

No person may operate a snowmobile within the Village limits at a speed in excess of 15 miles per hour.

SECTION 52.04 Hours of Operation.

No person may operate a snowmobile between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. except on an open, approved trail or on a Village-approved route for the purpose of gaining access to or from an open, approved trail.

SECTION 52.05 Unattended Snowmobiles.

No person may allow a snowmobile to be unattended on any public property, or on any property to which Section 346.63, Wis. Stats., is applicable, while the snowmobile motor is running or while the snowmobile ignition key is in the ignition.

In other news, the Police Department will be working on getting our website up and running in the early part of 2017. I spoke with representatives of the Cross Plains Optimist Club and they will again be hosting the bicycle rodeo. Preliminary plans are to hold it prior to the end of the school year. Our officers will again be helping out with the rodeo so stay tuned for further details on when the event will be held.

Several officers from our department, along with officers who live in the village, were invited to join our local boy scouts for a Euchre tournament during their lock in which was held at the Legion Hall. Fun was had by all and while I won't say who won or lost I for one want a rematch.

The Police Department received a banner from St. Francis Xavier showing their support of all of our officers. The banner was signed by the students and staff and was very much appreciated by all of our officers. Thank you!

Middleton - Cross Plains Area School District

The Middleton-Cross Plains Area School District learned that enrollment is expected to grow by slightly more than 900 students in its K-12 buildings by 2030-31, according to a report commissioned from Roffers Consulting and released in late December. Park, which currently has approximately 280 elementary students, is expected to grow to 394 students by 2030-31, the report projected. Capacity at the school is 324 students. Glacier Creek, which currently has almost 1,000 middle school students, is expected to grow by nearly 1,400 students over the next 14 years, according to the report. Capacity at the school is 900 students.

Roffers Consulting also projected housing growth in 2020, 2025 and 2030. The report projects that more than 4,100 new housing units will be built by 2030, with nearly 2,800 coming in the Glacier Creek attendance boundary areas. Park's attendance area is expected to see 550 more housing units over that span.

The District has created a Facilities Planning Committee, made up of more than 20 community members along with a few staff members, to look at the enrollment challenges and make recommendations to the Board of Education. Mark Roffers shared his preliminary findings with the FPC on Dec. 8, while the Board heard a similar report at its regular meeting on Dec. 12. The report can be found on the District website's Facility Planning page under For Community.

All 10 schools in the District have earned the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Energy Star certification, which signifies that the buildings perform in the top 25 percent of similar facilities nationwide for energy efficiency and meets strict energy efficiency performance levels set by the EPA. All of the schools are between 91-11 percent on the Energy Star rating scale, Energy Director Neal Bickler said. A building that scores a 75 or higher on EPA's 1-100 scale may be eligible for Energy Star certification.

Registration for the MCPASD 4K program for the 2017-18 school year opened on Jan. 2, 4K Principal Kari Saunders said. Forms are available on the 4K website, which can be accessed by going to www.mcpasd.k12.wi.us or families can register in person at the District Services Center, 7106 South Ave., Middleton, from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Monday through Friday. More than 1,900 students have participated in the program since it was implemented in 2011.

The MHS boys volleyball team was selected as one of five programs in the state to receive the WIAA Sportsmanship Award. MHS was selected for its sportsmanship at the State Boys Volleyball Tournament in Milwaukee. It is the second time the Cardinals have earned the honor in boys volleyball and the fifth time the school has been recognized overall. The Cardinals were recognized in boys volleyball in 2009, boys tennis in 2007 and 2009, and in girls tennis in 2013.

Parks and Recreation Department

We here at the Parks and Recreation Department hope this message finds you having a wonderful start to the New Year. 2017 has a lot in store for the department which we hope will positively impact our community. We will be implementing a few capital improvements in our parks, creating and implementing new programs in both recreation and aquatics, and maintaining conservancy projects at Hickory Hill, Glacial Valley and Westview Conservancies.

This year will also include the development of our 5 year Parks and Open Space Plan. This document presents the framework and policy that will assist and guide the department in the stewardship of our parks, facilities, and programs. Continuing to shape the Parks and Recreation Department will require focused energy and commitment from department staff, as well as support from you, our local community. Our first scheduled "Community Open House" is set for Monday, February 20, at 6:00 pm at the Rosemary Garfoot Public Library.

The 2017 Spring/Summer Activity Guide is scheduled to be in your mailbox by March 10th and on our website for download by March 3rd. This year's guide is packed with programs and events for all ages.





